The food system stabilized after the peak COVID-19 pandemic years, but delayed pandemic impacts are expected to continue to hit the grocery and restaurant sectors in coming years.

We saw a renewed focus on jobs and opportunity for food with the relaunch of agri-science training programs and the City of Detroit's planning focus on urban agriculture, solar generation, and sustainability.

Multiple small store grocery concepts launched as well, some with the support of the renewed Green Grocer Project from the Detroit Economic Growth Corporation (DEGC).

NEGATIVE

 SNAP Temporary Emergency Allotments end, returning program to pre-pandemic levels

We now have a common baseline and annual check-in with our partners in order to address gaps and improve the food system for all.






Small stores are not new to Detroit, but small stores that focus on health and community are gaining traction.

Detroit has nearly 1,200 SNAP food retailers and about 300 of those are categorized as convenience, specialty, or other.

Among those 300, one in three (30%) also hold a liquor license.
